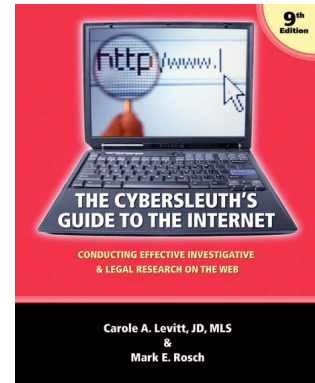
But in order to reap the benefits of the timesaving, cost-effective advantages of the Internet, legal professionals have to know how to find the information they're looking for—FAST AND FREE!
